GOLDEN JUBILEE

March 13, 1949 was the final day of the celebration of the Golden Jubilee of Protestantism in Puerto Rico. The week previous found the churches and missions in conferences; but the crowning event was a great joint celebration held on Sunday in the large ball park in down town San Juan. It was a great service lasting from 9:30 A.M. until 2:30 P.M. in which 65,000 people participated. A car load of unit members attended.

In an editorial in the PUERTO RICO EVANGELICO we read: "The people of God filled all the roads, and it was the city of St. John the Baptist of Puerto Rico, the Mecca toward which all these people of God were moving. Like this began that day. The day of commemoration of fifty years of Evangelical work in Puerto Rico. Like that began that day with a meeting of these men and women of a common faith, of an only Christ, of an only Gospel. So began that day, the last of the celebration."

An editorial in the DIARIO DE PUERTO RICO told of the profound solemnity of the occasion of 65,000 people meeting to celebrate fifty years of Protestant work in Puerto Rico. The wonderful choruses and the beautiful hymns that the crowds sang were very inspiring. "It was a celebration enobled by fifty years of good work without denominational distinction in the propagation of the ideals of Christianity. A celebration in support of that liberty of conscience which fortunately has always established itself permanently in the simple life of the Puerto Rican people, perhaps the greatest of human liberties."

He brought with him some movies to illustrate his talk, and they also made a record on Credit Unions that was broadcast over the radio two days later.

On Saturday the 12th of March the O.P.D. (out patient department) was finally established in its new home - the first floor of the Llinas "Casa Grande".

The following Monday, during the day, the first patients were admitted to the new hospital. That evening after supper the eight patients remaining in the old hospital were transferred to the new building also. The utilities (kitchen, laundry, etc.) followed in the next few days.

Some of the staff have crowded into the top floor of the Llinas house, a-waiting the completion of the apartment building. Others of the staff members are still housed in the P.R.R.A. "Casa Granda".

The 10,500 gallon cement water tank on the hill opposite the Llinas House was completed and will assure us of an adequate water supply at all times.

ACADEMY NEWS


